We are now in the middle of the data collection phase - an important stage of the project. Although in most countries programmes have been identified and questionnaires about these programmes have been completed by country-experts, there is still work to be done. Early impressions suggest that no such programmes exist in Hungary, Poland, and Romania. If you have heard of <u>eligible programmes</u> in these countries, do let us know. The good news is that currently we have already identified 161 programmes in 19 out of the 31 countries.

Country factsheets coming soon

Four first country factsheets will be published on the ICARE4EU website in June 2014. These country factsheets will describe the 'state of the art' regarding policy and practices to provide integrated care for people with multiple chronic conditions in Finland, Germany, Italy and the Netherlands.

Other news in integrated care

The WHO recently <u>launched a roadmap</u> on a framework for action towards coordinated/integrated health services delivery. ICARE4EU members were invited to a <u>consultation meeting in Brussels</u>. Many issues were explored, including how to: scale up successful initiatives, reform fragmented provider networks, bridge the gap between social and health care, use e-health effectively, manage change, have effective leadership and govern at the right level.

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
